Butterfly Gardens Taking Flight


If the stress of everyday living's got you gloomy, consider planting an uplifting butterfly garden. According to the ANLA, the last five years have seen a remarkable growth of these gardens-due in no small part to the beautiful creatures attracted to these colorful plots.

There are no great secrets to planting " successful butterfly gardens. Design them with the appropriate plants in a bright, sunny location-and "they will come." While the garden must contain nectar-producing flowers, host plants are also crucial

to creating the correct butterfly environment. Host plants provide caterpillar food and egg-laving areas for adult butterflies. Local landscapers and nurseries are the best resource for plants that will do best in a butterfly garden in our region. However, you can also find basic gardening books in any

library with recommended plants and what specific varieties to include for a successful butterfly garden.

The most important thing to remember when tending any butterfly garden is to not spray pesticides. Instead, hand-pick the pests off the plants or use insecticidal soaps. Proper plant selection should mitigate the extent of pest problems, or determine which pests visit your garden. Naturalist LuAnn Craighton, an expert on the development of butterfly gardens, explains that milkweeds are "wonderful hosts for monarchs, but golden aphids [plant louse] like them too," Nature also takes care of this problem, with milkweed bugs being especially fond of eating aphids. She adds that pest problems do vary from year to year, depending on the weather.

Perennials—What's Not to Like? The use of perennials in garden design has

been one of the more dramatic trends in gardening over the past ten-plus years. Unlike annuals, these plants return year after year. And because of their greater variety, growth habits and longer bloom period, they are great additions to any landscape design.

Jerry Fritz Garden Design selected some of the more popular and exuberant perennials available in our area:

Rudbeckia 'Goldstrum' – a longblooming, low maintenance, longliving perennial that likes both full sun and partial shade. The Perennial Plant Association voted 'Goldstrum' perennial plant of the year. Euphoria Var. Robbiae—A spreading hardy, evergreen perennial, it has rosettes of deep green leaves and lime-green flowers in the spring. It doesn't mind dry, less than rich soil, and works well as groundcover.

Lavender 'Dilly Dilly'-Hardy, vigorous, and fragrant, its dense and symmetrical
